Philadelphia's Magic Gardens (PMG) is an immersive mixed media art environment that is completely covered with mosaics. The creator, Isaiah Zagar, used handmade tiles, bottles, bicycle wheels, mirror, and international folk art to chronicle his life and influences. The space is made up of two indoor galleries and a bi-level outdoor sculpture garden.

As a nonprofit museum, PMG celebrates art in its many forms through community outreach, public programs, hands-on activities, exhibitions, and tours. We welcome everyone to explore the space and embrace the possibility of self-expression.

## **ABOUT ISAIAH ZAGAR**

Isaiah Zagar (born 1939) is the creator of PMG, several other fully-mosaicked sites, and more than 200 public mosaic murals throughout Philadelphia and the world. Born in Philadelphia and raised in Brooklyn, he received his B.F.A. from the Pratt Institute of Art. At 19 years old, Isaiah discovered the sprawling art environment of Clarence Schmidt in Woodstock, New York. This shaped his ideas of what art could be and started a lifelong interest in total works of art and their creators.

In the 1960s, Isaiah and his wife Julia (born 1940) worked with local artists as Peace Corps volunteers in Peru. Afterwards they settled on South Street in Philadelphia, where Isaiah experienced a mental health crisis that prompted his first experiments with mosaics. He used his art as therapy and started to create his own art environment. At the same time the Zagars opened the Eye's Gallery. The store featured Latin American folk art collected from their travels. Julia continues to run the business today.

In the 1970s the Zagars joined other activists and artists to protest the construction of a highway through their neighborhood. This ushered in a period of revitalization called the South Street Renaissance. Over the next 50 years Isaiah continued to mosaic more spaces. He fully embellished his current home (826 South St.), several studio spaces and rental properties, and nearby public walls. Isaiah no longer works independently on mosaics, but he does occasionally collaborate with PMG's preservation team to create new work.

## **HISTORY OF PMG**

In 1991, Isaiah started working on the vacant lots located near his studio at 1020 South St. He first mosaicked the buildings on either side of the property, then spent years sculpting multi-layer walls out of found objects.

In 2004, the owner of the lots discovered Isaiah's installation and decided to sell the land, calling for the work to be dismantled. Unwilling to witness the destruction, the community rushed to support the artist and his creation. Newly titled Philadelphia's Magic Gardens, the site became a nonprofit organization with the intention of preserving the artwork at PMG and throughout the South Street region.



PMG has over 20 staff members who support the programs that happen year-round on site and in the community. Feel free to ask questions or reach out for more information.
